

1912 Club Troop Patch Program



Experience a variety of activities with your troop and earn the 1912 Club Patch!

Juliette Gordon Low started Girl Scouts in 1912 to provide a safe all girls environment where they could try new things and learn and grow. While the activities for today's Girl Scouts may be different, the goal is the same.

Troops who include the activities below during the year can be sure the girls are getting a well-rounded Girl Scout experience!

Girls earn a free patch when their troop completes the requirements below and troop co-leaders complete a survey by June 15. Your stories are important to us, and we want to hear all about your troop's activities. Oh, and we love pictures—share those too!

1. Get Families Involved

Examples: Hold parent/family meetings, share specific ways families can help and be involved with the troop, include families in a Troop Bridging or Awards Ceremony.

2. Create the troop's year plan in the Volunteer Toolkit and share it with girls and families.

Examples: Create the troop year plan and let families know they can view the schedule in the Volunteer Toolkit through their MYGS account. Use the email templates to share troop meeting updates.

3. Participate in One Council or Service Unit event.

Examples: Attend a service unit or council event as a troop.

4. Earn Four Badges or Other Earned Awards

Examples: Grade Level Badges, Journey Awards, Daisy Petals, Highest Awards, Older Girl Leadership Awards

5. Participate in the Fall Product and/or Cookie Program

Examples: Girls participate in the Fall Product Program by selling nuts/chocolates/mags & more items and/or in the Cookie Program by selling iconic Girl Scout Cookies.

6. Participate in One Girl Scout Tradition

Examples: Learn a Girl Scout song, make SWAP's, celebrate Girl Scout holidays like World Thinking Day or Founder's Day.

7. Hold One Outdoor Outing

Examples: Attend a council camp or outdoor event, go on a troop hike, participate in Girl Scouts Love State Parks patch program.

8. Participate in One STEM Activity

Examples: Attend the Big Event, earn a STEM badge, attend a Mobile STEM Center event.

9. Go on a Troop Field Trip

Examples: Visit a fire station, state park, or community partner.

10. Participate in One Service Project or Take Action Project

Examples: Hold a food drive, plant trees, make cards for nursing home residents. (Service conducted as a part of a Journey Take Action project or Higher Award is also eligible.)



Requirements and submissions are "on your honor." Free patches are provided for every girl in the troop and two volunteers. Surveys will be available Spring 2024.
