Salute to Juliette Patch Program



Juliette Gordon Low founded Girl Scouts almost 112 years ago to give girls an opportunity to try new things and be today's leaders. This patch program takes us back in time to try new things as we explore who Juliette was and why the Girl Scout Movement was so important to her that she even sold her beloved strand of pearls to keep the Mission moving forward.

Steps to earn your Salute to Juliette patch:

- Order your patch (available while supplies last)!
- Complete the 3 required activities.
- Complete 5 additional activities of your choice.

Activities marked with * have additional resources attached to this document. Activities in <u>green</u> are linked to online resources.

Required

- □ Share three <u>fun facts</u> about Juliette Gordon Low with an adult.
- □ Read <u>Juliette Gordon Low's life story</u>.
- Serve your community. Brainstorm places that need volunteers and take action. Try a local park, food bank, community garden, soup kitchen, or animal shelter if you are unsure where to start.
- □ Create SWAPS to exchange with other Girl Scouts. Ex: Pumpkin* | Pearl Necklace*
- □ Throw a Juliette Gordon Low themed party.
 - Compete in a taffy pull*
 - Line up for a hoop roll relay race*
 - Join friends in a pancake relay race*
 - Test your memory with Kim's Game
- □ Complete a Juliette Gordon Low word search or crossword puzzle.*

- □ Hold a candle lighting ceremony.*
- Try a recipe from Juliette Gordon Low's time.*
- Juliette was born on Halloween! Get into the spirit with some Halloween crafts.

- Juliette was partially deaf for most of her life. Learn how to say "Happy Birthday" in ASL.
- □ Have a Daisy Sing-a-long.*
- Do a good deed daily...in October for Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Donate items to women who have survived or are currently fighting breast cancer. Ex: Blankets, warm hats, inspiring books, music, etc.

Pumpkin SWAPS

Materials

- 1 piece of 6 x 6 orange fabric/girl
- 1 piece of green 2 x 3 felt/girl
- 1 piece of green pipe cleaner/girl
- 1 styrofoam ball/girl
- 1 safety pin/girl
- Small sticks for pumpkin stems
- Glue
- Tags

- 1. Using the small piece of stick, poke a shallow hole in the top of the Styrofoam ball.
- 2. Place the fabric under the ball and wrap it around. Trim and stuff ends into the shallow hole to hold in place as needed.
- 3. Place a bit of glue into the hole and secure the piece of stick to be the stem of the pumpkin
- 4. Cut a leaf shape (s) out of the green felt and secure on top of the pumpkin shape.
- 5. To make the vine, wrap the pipe cleaner around a pencil, then cut into 4 pieces. Attach to the stick.
- 6. You are finished. Keep for yourself or use the safety pin to attach a label with your name and troop number and give away.





Pearl Necklace SWAPS

In 1914 Juliette sold a strand of rare matched pearls to pay the rent for the national office. She said "Jewels are not important, but my Girl Scouts are, they need money more than I need pearls".

Materials

- Thread
- Pearl Beads
- Scissors

- 1. Thread 8-10 pearl beads onto a string of embroidery thread. After stringing the beads, cut off excess string leaving just enough to tie both ends together.
- 2. Loop the mini bracelet onto a safety pin.
- 3. Then create your own tag for your SWAP, with a favorite fact or quote regarding Juliette Lowe and be sure to add your troop number.
- 4. Final step: Pin it affectionately somewhere!



Games

Taffy Pull

Here's something to chew on: When Girl Scouts founder Juliette Gordon Low was 10-yearsold, she and her family had an old fashioned taffy pull, making molasses taffy at home. As they worked on pulling the taffy, which aerates it and makes it softer, one of the young boys participating noticed that the molasses taffy and Juliette's hair had the same pretty, dark chestnut color in common.

He convinced her to let him braid some of the taffy into her long locks. Well, you can imagine what happened next. When the taffy and Juliette's hair refused to let go of one another, she was soon sporting a fashionable new short haircut.

Directions

- 1. Use a piece of taffy from the store or try making your own!
- 2. Working as a team or on your own, figure out how to stretch one piece of taffy into the longest single piece of taffy possible.

Use a measuring tape to figure out how far you can pull that taffy!

Hoop Roll

The hoop roll is another relay race. Each team will be given a hula hoop and must roll it from one end of the play area to the other and then back again. Each girl gets a turn, and whichever team finishes first wins.


Pancake Toss Relay Race

Divide girls into teams. Each team will need a plate, meant to represent a frying pan, and an oversized pancake. The girls should race in assigned lanes as they toss their pancake into the air and catch it on the plate.

Kim's Game

Kim's Game is a scavenger hunt. Show the girls a tray with many items on it and explain that each of those items is also hidden somewhere in the room or location that the party is being held. Send the girls out to find as many of the objects as they can.



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Candle Lighting Ceremony

Materials

- Candle (1 per girl)
- Matches/lighter
- Bucket with water

- 1. Have girls stand in a circle and give each girl one unlit candle. Explain you are doing a special Girl Scout ceremony. Ask girls to be respectful and quiet.
- 2. Have the narrator read the introduction below. "Long ago a special ceremony was formed. Juliette Low wanted the girls of her original troop to carry a special spark with them as their Girl Scout group broke up. Some from the girls were moving away, some working to help their families and some wanted to help a group of girls a little younger than themselves. Whatever their reasons, Juliette knew no other group would ever quite be the same. As the girls stood in a circle holding candles they had made, Juliette knew what spark it was that she wanted to pass on. She lit her candle and spoke."
- 3. Have the adult reading Juliette Low's part read the passage below. "With this candle I, Juliette Low, give you each something very special to pass on. As I light the candle on my right I ask each of you to light the candle to your right and pass it on. I want you to carry this thought with you wherever you go. This is the ETERNAL FLAME of Girl Scouts."
- 4. Light the candles, starting with the adult reading the Juliette Low part and going around the circle to the right.
- 5. Have the adult reading Juliette Low's part read the passage below. "Now that we all have the ETERNAL FLAME, let's say the Girl Scout Promise. Then we will think about and share our favorite memories from our time together in Girl Scouts."
- 6. Recite the Girl Scout Promise and give girls time to share their favorite memories.
- Have the adult reading Juliette Low's part read the passage below.
 "I will hold my candle up and as I do, you will all raise yours and we will blow them out together."

Recipes

Home making was a large part of women's lives in the 1800's. Many Girl Scout badges were designed to help girls learn these important skills, such as milking cows, animal trapping and butchering, cooking over open fires, and budgeting rations. Over the years those badges have not only inured but evolved to include kitchen safety, meal planning, learning to eat healthy, gardening and exotic cuisines around the world.

Applesauce

Ingredients

- 6 apples
- 1/4 cup water
- 1/2 cup sugar
- A few grains of salt

Steps

- 1. Wash and cut apples in pieces, removing only stem and blossom end .
- 2. Cook covered in small quantity of water until soft.
- 3. Press through strainer or sieve. If sauce seems too thin, cook it with the cover off.
- 4. Sweeten to taste, add salt or additional flavoring if desired.
- 5. Note: The amount of water needed varies with the juiciness of the apples. Cinnamon, nutmeg, or lemon juice may be added.

Pumpkin Bread

Ingredients

- 1 cup pumpkin puree (fresh or canned)
- 1 cup cornmeal
- 2 cups bread flour
- 1 package yeast dissolved in 1/4 cup warm water
- 1 tablespoon molasses
- 1 teaspoon salt

- 1. In a medium sized bowl, mix the dry ingredients then add the wet ingredients.
- 2. Knead on a floured surface for 6-8 minutes adding flour to make a soft dough.
- Place in a greased bowl and cover with a warm, wet cloth and set in a warm spot for 30 minutes to let it rise.
- 4. Punch down the dough. Grease your bread pan(s) and form a loaf in it.
- 5. Let it rise in a warm spot, covered with a wet cloth for an hour.
- 6. Preheat oven to 375°F and bake for 20-30 minutes.
- 7. Remove from pan and cool on a cooling rack.

Recipes

Tea Cake

Ingredients

- 4 egg yolks
- 2 whole eggs
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
- 1 and 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/2 lb butter
- Sifted flour

Steps

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. Break eggs into a small bowl and beat.
- 3. Dissolve Baking Powder in the vinegar; add the vinegar mixture into the beaten eggs.
- 4. Put Sugar into a medium-sized bowl; make a divot in the center of the sugar. Pour the egg mixture into the sugar and stir with a wooden spoon until well blended.
- 5. Soften the butter and cream into the batter.
- 6. Stir in enough Sifted Flour until it forms a hick batter.
- Bake in a buttered 8-inch cake pan for 35-40 minutes.

Original Girl Scout Cookie

Ingredients

- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons of milk
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon of vanilla
- 2 cups of flour
- 2 teaspoons of baking powder

- 1. Cream butter and sugar; add well beaten eggs, then milk vanilla, flour, and baking powder.
- 2. Roll thin and bake (sprinkle sugar on top.)
- Modern Day tips: Refrigerate batter for at least one hour before rolling and cutting cookies. Bake in over at 375° for approximately 8 to 10 minutes or until the edges begin to brown.
